Introduction

KOVAR Corporation is a Virginia Knights of Columbus 501(c) (3) tax-exempt charity established in 1971 to provide financial assistance through grants and home loans to tax-exempt organizations providing training and opportunities to persons with intellectual disabilities. KOVAR has provided over \$18,000,000 in grants and \$6,000,000 in no-interest home loans to non-profit organizations who support persons with ID within the Commonwealth of Virginia.

Mission

KOVAR Corporation exists to improve the quality of life for Virginians with Intellectual Disabilities through the grant and home loan programs. These programs are facilitated by the efforts of Virginia Knights of Columbus Councils who raise money for KOVAR and individual donors.

Year in Review

Our Fiscal Year¹ (FY) 2022 was a complete success. We provided 24 grants to 23 non-profit organizations totaling \$346,000. Our home loan program has 13 loans with 7 non-profit organizations in force, totaling over \$1,300,000. Due to the extraordinary efforts of the 150+ Knights of Columbus (KofC) Councils throughout the Commonwealth of Virginia, together we raised over \$524,000 which was available in FY 2023 for the grant and home loan programs. The Board of Directors redoubled their efforts to improve stewardship and governance.

KOVAR is your Virginia Knights of Columbus charity that provides service to Virginians with intellectual disabilities. The non-profit organizations who we work with provide support and services such as job and life skills training, employment, education, housing, athletics, and transportation to our friends with Intellectual Disabilities.

Programs and Results

KOVAR operates two programs with non-profit organizations that specialize in supporting individuals with Intellectual Disabilities: Grants and Home Loans.

Grants

Since 1971, KOVAR has provided grants to qualifying 501 (c) (3) [non-profit] organizations to improve the quality of life to Virginians with ID.

Grant requests are reviewed by the KOVAR Board as received every two months. The maximum amount for a grant in FY22 was \$15,000 and the waiting period for a single non-profit organization between grants is 15-months.

Each grant recipient signs a contract with KOVAR before we provide funding. We require each grant recipient to provide documentation and receipts within six months to ensure they spent the money the way it was approved. The KOVAR Audit Committee reviews all submissions and once the organization passes the audit, they are eligible to apply for a subsequent grant once they satisfy the waiting period.

During the fiscal year 2022, KOVAR awarded 24 grants to 23 non-profit organizations totaling over \$346,000 reaching across the entirety of the Commonwealth of Virginia as shown below in figure 1 and listed in table 1.

Home Loans

Since 1994, KOVAR has been and continues to be the sole provider within the Commonwealth of Virginia for interest-free loans to non-profit organizations in the purchase of group homes. Although these loans are interest-free, they are subject to the same lending requirements imposed by banks and commercial lenders. In the 25-plus year history of home loans, KOVAR has never experienced a default. Monthly payments are returned to the Home Loan Fund for future loans.

Group homes provide persons with ID safe, comfortable, and dignified places to live. These homes typically house 4 or 5 persons with ID and provide various levels of care.

Loan amounts cannot exceed 75% of appraised value with a maximum of up to \$150,000 for 10-year loans and \$150,000 - \$250,000 for 15-year loans.

Fundraising

Since 1971, through the efforts of 150-plus Knights of Columbus (KofC) councils across the Commonwealth of Virginia, KOVAR has raised over \$18 million. In fiscal year 2022, over \$524,000 was raised. Individual councils conduct a variety of fundraising activities at their parish and local community level.

KOVAR also conducts an annual, direct mail campaign to the over 28,000 KofC members in the Commonwealth of Virginia. Individual donations are received through direct mailing, workplace payroll deductions, and other online organizations such as GiveDirect, Combined Federal Campaign, and the United Way.

Financial Statements

Overview

During FY22, KOVAR's Board of Directors redoubled their efforts to improve the quality and timeliness of financial transactions and data. Governance

To improve the overall fiscal health of the Corporation, the Board reviewed, updated existing polices, strengthening control, oversight, and stewardship. In addition, it established three new policies:

- Conflict of Interest
- Document Retention and Destruction
- Whistleblower

The cumulative effect these policies have will result in a more effective and efficient organization with full transparencies to all stakeholders. Another positive aspect is we expect to increase our 'score' on Charity Navigator <u>https://www.charitynavigator.org/ein/237337216</u> from 91 to 100% (maximum) which will instill confidence in prospective donors and other stakeholders that KOVAR is appropriately led and managed.

The Board continues to review all its policies to ensure they remain current and support active management of the Corporation.

Management's Responsibility for Financial Reporting

The Board is responsible for the integrity and objectivity of the financial information presented in this annual report. The financial statements that appear in this document have been selected from the audited consolidated financial statements to give summary financial information about KOVAR. The selected financial information was prepared by KOVAR in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles ("GAAP"). The KOVAR Board of Directors believe the financial information contained in the audited consolidated financial statements fairly represents KOVAR's financial position, results of operations and cash flows. A copy of the complete audited consolidated financial statements of KOVAR, including Anderson & Reed LLP unqualified independent auditor's report thereon, is available upon request.

KOVAR's internal controls are designed to reasonably ensure that its assets are safeguarded from unauthorized use or disposition and that transactions are authorized, executed and recorded properly.
